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Minutes of the 852nd Provincial Council Meeting Hales Corners, Wis., June 30, 2015

PRESENT: Fr. Ed Kilianski, interim provincial superior; Fr. Byron Haaland, Fr. Jack Kurps, Br. Duane Lemke and Fr. Christianus Hendrik, councilors; Br. Frank Presto, provincial secretary; Mary Gorski, minutes; Dn. David Nagel, provincial treasurer.

I. Formation

- A. Fr. Joseph Pham Vu — The council voted to approve Frater Vu for renewal of vows.
- B. Frater Justin Krenke — The council voted to approve Frater Krenke for renewal of vows.
- C. Frater Juan Carlos Castañeda Rojas — The council voted to approve Frater Castañeda Rojas for renewal of vows.
- D. Frater James Nguyen — The council voted to approve Frater Nguyen for renewal of vows.
- E. Follow-up — Br. Presto will write letters for the four men approved for vow renewal, authorizing the date of their renewal and the SCJ who will be delegated to receive their vows. Fr. Kilianski will call each of the men to let him know that he has been approved for advancement in formation.

II. Election Assembly

- A. Bylaws — Br. Presto introduced the Election Assembly Bylaws; they are adapted from the previous chapter to allow for a shorter election process. The adaptations were approved by the General Council. Among the changes: there will not be a mail-in discernment ballot and there will be no State of the Province report.

Councilors discussed and clarified the bylaws. It was noted that the newly elected provincial superior becomes the president of the assembly upon his election.

The council voted to approve the Election Bylaws with minor changes. Br. Presto was asked to check on language consistency before finalizing the document (for example, straw vote or test vote — choose one).

- B. Schedule — The Election Assembly will begin on Monday, August 24 at 1:00 p.m. with prayer. The tentative schedule has morning prayer taking place in the Provincial Conference Center. Lunch will be at noon; evening social and dinner will be at 6 p.m.

Fr. John van den Hengel will be the moderator of the assembly. He sent a memo in which he suggested that the assembly review the minutes of the last Provincial Chapter and the final document of the recent General Chapter before the voting process begins. Elections should take place in light of these two events.

The council decided that discussion of these documents from the Provincial and General Chapters will be on Monday afternoon, following a keynote address by the four SCJs in temporary vows. The documents (including the Province Chapter Synthesis Statement), or links to them, will be given to members of the province prior to the assembly.

Fr. Kilianski, in his role as interim provincial superior and as a delegate to the chapter, will lead the review of the General Chapter, along with Fr. Duy Nguyen, who was also a delegate.

Fr. Kilianski will also lead the review of the Provincial Chapter. It was suggested that in doing so that he speak to the difficulty of determining urgent realities on which the province must focus. Often there are many urgent needs that need attention at the same time. What are the urgent realities that the province needs to focus on now, at this moment in time? What are the priorities that the province wants the next administration to focus on?

The initial draft of the Election Assembly schedule allowed time for a “preference ballot” to get a “sounding” of the membership prior to the election process. Councilors said that straw ballots prior to canonical elections are sufficient. After a straw vote for the provincial superior it was suggested that there be table discussions. Each table will be asked to surface two names for consideration and suggest qualities needed for leadership as provincial superior in this moment of time for the province. This would be followed by a second table discussion during which participants would process what they heard.

It is expected that most of Tuesday will be centered on discernment of the provincial superior. If there is sufficient time after the election of the provincial superior, the moderator can decide to begin the discernment process for the Provincial Council.

The council suggested that the schedule be loosely defined to allow the moderator (and the assembly itself) flexibility in adjusting the process as needed. It is important that the focus be on the process, not on time blocks.

It is expected that the work of the assembly can be done without evening sessions; however, SCJs will be informed that if needed, there is the possibility that they may meet briefly after dinner.

- C. Prayer — Fr. Yvon Sheehy is in-charge of prayer for the assembly. Fr. Kilianski is going to contact him next week (week of July 6) to get a sense of his plans. He will work with him to assign presiders and other liturgical ministers. Diane Skrobus and Mary MacDonald will be music ministers. Eucharist will be at the SHML chapel. As noted, morning prayer will be at the Conference Center prior to the start of assembly sessions.

It was suggested that adoration be at 11:30, prior to lunch and that Eucharist be prior to dinner.

- D. Meals — Lunch and supper will be at the public dining room of SHML.
- E. Lists of candidates — Fr. Stephen Huffstetter is expected to bring the approved list of candidates for provincial superior and council when he comes back to Hales Corners from Rome this week. Br. Presto will send the council (by email) the list of those SCJs who withdrew their names for consideration.
- F. Mailing — Br. Presto plans to mail the bylaws, schedule and lists of names for consideration to the membership within the next few days. Also included will be instructions for requesting a proxy vote. The deadline for making a proxy request is July 31.
- G. Fr. John van den Hengel — Fr. van den Hengel will be in Hales Corners on Monday, July 27, to review the election process with Br. Presto. Fr. Kilianski is going to try to be present for the meeting either in-person or by phone.

- III. Next meeting — The Provincial Council will meet August 3-4. During that meeting councilors will take time to review the past two years of their term and talk about transition issues for the next administration.

Minutes of the 853rd Provincial Council Meeting Hales Corners, Wis., August 3-4, 2015

PRESENT: Fr. Ed Kilianski, interim provincial superior; Fr. Byron Haaland, Fr. Jack Kurps, Br. Duane Lemke and Fr. Christianus Hendrik, councilors; Br. Frank Presto, provincial secretary; Mary Gorski, minutes; Dn. David Nagel, provincial treasurer.

I. Check-in — Councilors took a few minutes to update each other on themselves, their communities and ministries. Most mentioned the transitional nature of the summer with the election of Fr. Stephen Huffstetter to the General Council and preparation for the August Election Assembly.

II. Administration

A. Transitioning — Councilors were invited to list issues or concerns that they believe are important to identify for the next administration. They included:

1. Visitation of St. Joseph's Community (4th Floor) — Fr. Haaland's term as local superior ends in December. A visitation and consultation needs to be done with the community soon.
2. International SCJs in the US for extended studies or assignment — Guidelines need to be established regarding international SCJs in the US Province for extended periods of time. To whom are they responsible? How are expectations defined? There are concerns regarding international SCJs celebrating Mass outside of a community house. In the United States, a priest must have appropriate faculties to celebrate Mass outside of the community. For a member of the US Province to receive a recommendation for faculties he must be in compliance with the province's Praesidium requirements. However, since they aren't members of the province, the international SCJs generally are not in compliance with these standards. Should international SCJs in the United States for an extended stay be expected to fulfill the province requirements regarding Praesidium standards?

Also, the issue of SCJs residing in the United States independent of the US Province needs to be addressed at the general level. For example, there is an SCJ priest from Congo in the Diocese of Brownsville in a contractual agreement with the local bishop. If that SCJ were to become involved in a legal situation, civil authorities (and public opinion) would most likely not make the distinction that the SCJ is there independent of the province. What any SCJ does in the United States reflects on the US Province. Because of this, the administration of the US Province must be consulted when an international SCJ is to be in the country for an extended period of time, regardless if it is for studies, sabbatical or ministry.

Kathleen Dahlgren, province attorney, suggests that any SCJ who stays in the US for an extended period of time become a member of the province. Br. Presto echoed the suggestion, noting that it is not just for legal concerns. It is important that the SCJ feel that he is a part of the life of the province.

It was noted that two international SCJs will be with the Dehon Formation Community in Chicago in the fall. Br. Lemke will inform them that they cannot celebrate Mass outside of the community. There was a question as to whether a pastor could give permission for a priest to celebrate Mass at his parish without the formal granting of faculties from a diocese. Generally the province operates on the assumption that faculties need to be granted by the local bishop's office.

3. Personnel issues — Part of the transition process with the new administration will be to update incoming leadership on various personnel concerns.
 4. Assemblies and other gatherings — The next administration should be encouraged to continue to build on assemblies, chapters and other gatherings from the past. Such events should not happen in isolation.
- B. Vow renewals — Br. Presto said that four SCJs are renewing their vows in August. The authorizations are in place for them.
- C. Election Assembly
1. Planning meeting — Br. Presto, Fr. Kilianski and Fr. Kurps met with Fr. John van den Hengel, assembly moderator, on July 27. Mary Gorski was also present to take notes. There is no steering committee for the Election Assembly; the interim provincial superior, and then the newly elected provincial, will be the authority of the assembly. This informal

ad hoc group serves as a sounding board to him, assisting in its organization and implementation.

The council reviewed the minutes from the meeting.

2. Valid election — Over half of the province will be represented at the assembly making it a valid election. A councilor asked if those who were excused from the assembly for health reasons were counted in the overall number of eligible voters. It is a moot point at this time but something to review for the future.
3. Assembly schedule — Br. Presto reviewed changes in the assembly schedule that came as a result of the July 28 meeting. Of note:
 - a. A test ballot for provincial superior and councilors will be done at the end of the day on Monday; the results will be distributed after evening Mass.
 - b. The review of the provincial and general chapters will take place Tuesday morning instead of Monday afternoon.
 - c. At the end of Tuesday morning there will be a test ballot for provincial superior. Tuesday afternoon will be devoted to the election of the provincial superior. The day's activities will come to an end after the election is complete. The assembly will then meet for Mass at 5 p.m.
 - d. On Wednesday morning the assembly will have time to reflect on the team needed for Provincial Council. A test vote will take place before adoration and lunch. The afternoon will be devoted to the canonical election of three councilors, one after the other.
 - e. On Thursday morning the assembly will once again reflect on the team needed for Provincial Council. A test vote will take place before adoration and lunch. The afternoon will be devoted to the canonical election of the final two councilors, one after the other.
 - f. If the schedule flows as planned, the Thursday evening liturgy will be Mass of Thanksgiving during which the new provincial superior will be installed.
4. Reaction — Councilors said that they liked the flow of the proposed schedule. The bylaws will need to be slightly adapted to allow for some of the suggestions. It was noted that the schedule can be adjusted during the process. The moderator will work with Fr. Kilianski in determining whether adjustments need to be made.
5. Tables — As with the chapter, participants will be seated randomly at a table. The moderator, in consultation with others, will monitor the tables and assess whether they should be reconfigured or remain the same during the assembly.
6. Installation; beginning of term — The new administration will begin its term on August 27.
7. Bylaws — The council reviewed the following changes to the Election Assembly bylaws:
 - a. No. 12 — The council voted to change No. 12 to read as follows: “The secretary, recording secretary and tellers will be appointed by the provincial superior and his council prior to the Election Assembly. The provincial superior or his delegate will administer the oath of secrecy to the secretary and tellers during the opening session of the assembly.”
 - b. No. 15 — The council voted to add the sentence: “Additional test votes may occur.”
 - c. No. 17.b — The council voted to revise the text in 17.b. to read: “A test vote will be conducted with each member with active voice submitting names from the respective list approved by the Superior General and his council. The results of this test vote will be announced publicly to the assembly.”
8. Assembly appointments — The council voted to approve the following appointments for the Election Assembly:

Moderator: Fr. John van den Hengel

Secretary of the Assembly: Br. Frank Presto

Recording Secretary: Mary Gorski

Tellers: Fr. Gregory Schill, Br. Brian Tompkins, Fr. Joseph Thien Dinh and Br. Duane Lemke

9. Mailing — Br. Presto will mail the revised bylaws and updated schedule to the membership by the end of the week.
 10. Proxy votes — Br. Presto will contact those who have been granted proxy votes but who have not yet stated who holds their proxy.
- D. Future council meetings — This is the last scheduled meeting of the current administration. The next administration will schedule meetings according to its members' schedules.
- E. Richard Scheiber — Mr. Scheiber is a former SCJ priest. He left to get married. In 1989 he started the process for laicization. For various reasons that process has not been completed. The paperwork for the process is now complete; Fr. David Szatkowski, canonist, has reviewed it.

The council voted to endorse Fr. Kilianski's proposal to submit to Fr. Heiner Wilmer and his council the petition for Dispensation from the Obligation of the Clerical State for Mr. Richard Scheiber. Fr. Kilianski and the council endorse the petition and encourage that it be granted.

Br. Presto will send the petition to the Generalate on Wednesday, August 5.

- F. Committees — The council briefly reviewed the activities of the following committees:
1. Immigration — This is a committee that sprung from the North American Continental Conference and is composed of SCJs from both Canada and the US. The group's current focus has been on the collection of personal stories of immigration. A book with these stories will be made available in fall. The terms of current members expire in December. Although some are open to renewing their term, it is hoped that other SCJs will take interest in continuing the process of "see, judge, act." Br. Lemke has been involved with this committee and said that he has found it to be very good; he is pleased with its efforts in collecting the immigration stories.
 2. Senior life — Fr. Tony Russo is spearheading this. Fr. Kilianski recently spoke to him and learned that the group has had a meeting and plans to have another in September. They are hoping to make recommendations to the next provincial administration regarding possibilities for members remaining in community as long as possible when faced with health concerns. Such possibilities might include the type of assistance one might find in assisted living situations.
 3. Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology — A committee of SCJs with connections to the seminary was asked by the Provincial Council to meet and raise questions that could be a part of the province discussion about SHSST. This came out of work on the province plan. The council suggested that a dialogue include discussion of the province's role in the training of seminarians for the priesthood and lay people for service to the Church, as well as the province's overall vision for SHSST. The committee had meetings earlier in the year and was to have met with the council at this meeting. However, with the upcoming change in administration the meeting with the council was postponed. The next administration will be advised to review the committee's work and possibilities for next steps.
 4. Youth — A committee with SCJs from Canada and the US was established to further a variety of concerns/possibilities in regards to youth. Also, Fr. Hendrik created a youth initiative in the US Province, preparing young SCJs to work with youth.
- G. Province Plan — It was suggested that the next administration review the work done on developing a province plan.
- H. CMSM and Mass with Pope Francis — Pope Francis will celebrate Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. on September 23. Major superiors have been invited to sit in a special section at the outdoor assembly. Fr. Kilianski asked the council's opinion regarding the SCJs' representation. The deadline to register is immediate. However, Fr. Kilianski notes that the province will not know who its major superior is until the end of August. Councilors agreed that it is important the SCJs have a presence at the gathering and that Fr. Kilianski should make travel arrangements to be there. If another SCJ is elected as provincial superior he will contact CMSM about the change.
- I. "Havens of Mercy" — The Archdiocese of Milwaukee, in response to the "Year of Mercy" that runs from December 8, 2015 through November 20, 2016, asked the province if it would be willing to designate a site or sites as "Havens of Mercy" where confessors would be available to offer reconciliation. The province would determine locations and scheduling; the archdiocese would publicize the information.

Councilors were in favor of participating in this. Locations suggested: SHML, SHSST and St. Martin of Tours. The entire SCJ community in Milwaukee should be a part of the dialogue on this. Br. Presto will contact Barbara Anne Cusack, Milwaukee chancellor, for more information.

It was noted that the project fits in well with the SCJs' call to be "Prophets of love and servants of reconciliation," and would also be a nice way to reach out to the Milwaukee community.

- J. Fr. Jean Baptiste Nsimi Bekoka — Fr. Kilianski received a letter from the interim provincial superior of Cameroon seeking permission for Fr. Nsimi Bekoka to do a sabbatical year in the United States, partially for health reasons. Councilors would like to have a better sense of the expectations for Fr. Nsimi Bekoka's sabbatical, including his health needs.

Fr. Kilianski will work with Fr. Brown, who speaks French, to communicate with the Cameroon Province to clarify the sabbatical request and expectations.

III. Personnel

- A. Background checks — Br. Presto updated the council on background checks of the membership. He is pleased that there was almost a 90% compliance rate. All criminal checks came back "clean." A few traffic violations were surfaced, as were concerns about the number of credit cards that some members appear to have (as noted in the credit report). The number and use of credit cards is a topic that the next administration may want to address.

Those who have not responded will be contacted as soon as possible. They will receive a second set of forms and be told that the province cannot state that they are suitable for ministry (when an inquiry is made regarding faculties) if they do not comply with the background check. The background check is a significant piece of the Praesidium process.

Although it was initially suggested that Fr. Kilianski contact those who have not responded, councilors said that Br. Presto, as provincial secretary, is the appropriate one to do so.

Related to Praesidium accreditation, possibilities for on-going education hours will be brought to the next administration at one of its first meetings. Br. Presto is handling this.

- B. Br. Andrzej ("Andy") Gancarczyk — Br. Gancarczyk is now a member of the US Province.
- C. Statistics — The council reviewed the personnel statistics for the US Province. It was noted that 70 members are 60 years and older.
- D. Medical information — Councilors recognized the importance of having an accurate record of a person's medical history, or at least his medications, available in case of a medical emergency. They suggest that the next administration encourage, or perhaps mandate, that members have a list of their medications in a place that can be accessed by another if needed. It was noted that some religious communities encourage their members to keep such a list inside their medicine cabinet in the bathroom, or in their wallet. It could also be in a file in the local superior's office.

IV. Finance

- A. Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology — Work is being done on the grounds in front of SHSST to allow for more parking in the front. The project has been delayed by the Department of Natural Resources which indicted that more drainage needed to be implemented. Piping is being brought in. It is hoped that the project will be complete before the fall semester begins.
- B. Art studio — Groundbreaking on the art studio on the Woods Road property is to be this week. There were delays in regards to permits.
- C. New general treasurer — Fr. Luca Zottoli of the North Italian Province has been named the new general treasurer.
- D. Province Development Office — The office is getting ready for its yearly audit. Dn. Nagel emphasized that the office is still in the midst of a turn-around process. Highlights include an increase in the file size (the first time in five years), an increase of reactivated donors (and revenue from them), and a 10% improvement in maintaining file size (a key indicator of file health). However, the Spanish file continues to decline.

The office's consulting contract with Innovairre ends in June, 2016. Innovairre is open to allowing it to end in April. Kory Christianson, executive director of development at St. Joseph's Indian School, will be hired as a consultant and be involved in planning next year's mailings.

- E. Investments — Dn. Nagel said that the markets have been up and down quite a bit in recent months. The Investment Committee and Stakeholders Meetings are scheduled for August 18. Dn. Nagel proposed that Fr. Wayne Jenkins be appointed as a trustee on the Employee Retirement Trust; Dn. Nagel spoke to Fr. Jenkins and he agreed to serve.

The council voted to appoint Fr. Wayne Jenkins to a three-year term as a trustee on the Employee Retirement Trust.

- F. Corporate Resolution — The council voted to approve the following corporate resolution:

“BE IT RESOLVED, that the Priests of the Sacred Heart, Wisconsin religious corporation, hereby appoints Deacon David Nagel, SCJ, as Provincial Treasurer with full authority to transact business on behalf of the Priests of the Sacred Heart, including but not limited to retaining the services of Merrill Lynch and other investment managers.”

- G. Insurance — The SCJ insurance plan comes up for renewal in October. Dn. Nagel reviewed health care expenses for the past year; the SCJ Medical Plan covered 72% of the costs. The monthly member contribution increased to \$1,100 on July 1 to better reflect expenses.

The human resource directors of the various province offices, along with the treasurer's office, have been reviewing the current employee health care plan with Wisconsin Blue Cross Blue Shield. There have been concerns regarding service with this plan. The employee plan will switch to Wellmark Blue Cross Blue Shield of South Dakota as of January 1, 2016. The HR directors and Dn. Nagel visited Wellmark in July and were impressed by the organization.

V. Future meetings

- A. Conference call — The council will meet by conference call on Tuesday, August 11 at 10 a.m. (central) to review these minutes.
- B. Transition meeting — Although it is dependent on the desire of the next administration, it was suggested that a transition meeting with the old and new administrations be held Friday morning after the election, August 28, starting at 9 a.m. in the Provincial Offices board room. It was also suggested that the out-going and in-coming administrations go out for a meal together that evening.

Notes from Justice Peace & Reconciliation Commission Meeting June 2-3, 2015

1. Meeting began Tuesday evening with member updates and prayer.
2. Mark gave his director's report, including working with Common Ground at St. Martin of Tours and going to Massachusetts in July to meet with executives of TJX Companies (TJMaxx) on behalf of WIM/CRI (WI/IL/MN Coalition on Responsible Investment) on corporate responsibility. Discussion ensued regarding the director's job description and priorities, which led to the idea of Mark's getting more involved with one of our "partner" organizations here in Milwaukee, the Dominican Center. He will talk to their director about helping with their neighborhood organizing.
3. The commission looked over the approved JPR budget and had some preliminary discussion of our partner groups and funding criteria before adjourning till morning. It became evident in our discussion that the JPR Commission has long seen these entities which it funds as extensions of the ministry of the Province, true partners in ministry, not merely "outside agencies." We believe this to be true for several reasons: 1) The SCJ charism is heavily committed to establishing the Reign of the Sacred Heart in souls and societies; 2) the laity are increasingly owning their role in Church ministry, and this is a way of collaborating with them; 3) These ministries are located within our ministerial areas and engaged in ministries we are unable to do on our own. They help to create a more just milieu for our overall ministry. The Commission feels strongly that the old criterion of direct, ongoing SCJ involvement in groups that we fund should no longer be the primary benchmark given our reduced numbers. SCJs may be involved on a short term basis as is the case with the Darst Center and Port Ministries, or the JPR Director be the connection. With an organization like Casa Juan Diego, the connection may be through the involvement of parishioners at SCJ-run parishes. In special cases, like that of St. John's Shelter in Green Bay, the Priests of the Sacred Heart may no longer even be ministering in the area, but the SCJ connection is still strong because of Fr. Guy Blair's legacy.
4. In the morning, we visited first The Port Ministries and then the Brother David Darst Center. The former is located in the Back of the Yards neighborhood, always home to new immigrants and the working poor and the first place to be organized by Saul Alinski in the 30's. A former parish complex, it is now being run by the Franciscans, who operate a free clinic, a "bread truck" that brings sandwiches to 300 homeless and hungry six days a week, a gym and computer center. Their ministry focuses on families, providing care, meals and activities and after-school tutoring for children 3-18 while parents take GED classes. They are a very frugal organization. For example, their clinic treats people for the equivalent of \$20 a year per person (that averages to about 5-7 visits per year per person), and their sandwiches cost about 30 cents apiece, all thanks to volunteers, donations and low overhead. Members of the Formation Community have volunteered at the Port over the years.

The Darst Center is a unique ministry focused on justice education. They partner with Port Ministries and many other local agencies to provide up to weeklong "urban plunge" experiences for students from 8th Grade through college. Central to the experience are their reflection and discussion processes following each day's visits and prayer and worship experiences. Catholic social teaching is brought alive for about 800 young people a year in this way. The Center operates on a shoestring budget and with three very

dedicated employees. The 8th Day Center has used the Darst Center for several years when conducting urban plunges for religious communities. Joseph Vu, SCJ, has worked at Darst for over two years as part of his apostolic assignment and , among other activities, created a professional booklet which the center uses during its immersion experiences.

5. In the afternoon, we looked at the groups who applied for funding for 2015-16. We decided to continue funding at last year's levels for Milwaukee's Benedict Center for Criminal Justice, Common Ground, the Dominican Center and SET Ministry. In Chicago, we agreed to maintain last year's funding level for the 8th Day Center, while increasing funding of the Darst Center to \$5000 and Port Ministries to \$3500. In Houston, we will continue funding for Casa Juan Diego, Catholic Charities, Magnificat Houses and TMO (the Metropolitan Organization). St. John's Shelter in Green Bay will be increased to \$5000. Details about this year's grantees will be on the JPR website.
6. We concluded at 2:15 PM and agreed to meet again in Milwaukee on Sept. 14. A site visit to the Dominican Center will be included.
