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Minutes of the 861st Provincial Council Meeting Conference Call, June 28, 2016

PRESENT: Fr. Ed Kilianski, provincial superior; Fr. Quang Nguyen, Fr. Duy Nguyen, Fr. Christianus Hendrik, Fr. Jack Kurps and Br. Frank Presto, councilors; Mary Gorski, recording secretary.

I. Vow renewal requests —

- A. Frater Joseph Pham Vu — Fra. Vu wrote two letters of request; the first was for renewal of vows (this request was endorsed by the Dehon Formation Community house council) and the second was a request to prolong by one year his time in temporary vows beyond the maximum of six years that is specified in the Rule of Life, Constitution No. 102.

Fra. Vu is expected to begin his final vows preparation at the beginning of 2017.

The council voted to approve Fra. Joseph Pham Vu for renewal of vows, and voted to approve Frater Vu for a seventh year in temporary vows, exceeding the six-year maximum in temporary vows as specified in Constitution No. 102.

- B. Frater Juan Carlos Castañeda Rojas — The council voted to approve Fra. Juan Carlos Castañeda Rojas' request for renewal of vows. This request was endorsed by the Dehon Formation Community house council.
- C. Frater James Nguyen — The council voted to approve Fra. James Nguyen's request for renewal of vows. This request was endorsed by the Dehon Formation Community house council.
- D. Frater Justin Krenke — The council voted to approve Fra. Justin Krenke's request for renewal of vows. This request was endorsed by the Dehon Formation Community house council.

- II. Finance — Br. Presto shared a few updates from Dn. David Nagel, province treasurer. He informed the council that Monica Matthews would no longer be serving the province as the financial consultant from Merrill Lynch. Garrett Stinson, the province's independent investment advisor from SageView, is assisting in the search for a new financial consultant. More information about the transition will be shared at the July council meeting. Dn. Nagel also noted that the Brexit vote has impacted investments globally.

III. Personnel

- A. Jose Romero-Olivas — Fr Kilianski informed the council that Jose Romero-Olivas, a recently accepted candidate, arrived in Hales Corners for ESL. At the end of July Kelly Kornacki, ESL academic director, will evaluate his progress. If she feels that his English skills are at a college level he will move to Chicago to join the formation program there. If he needs more ESL study, he will remain in the ESL program. During his time in the ESL program Fr. Paul Kelly will serve as his formation director.
- B. Frs. David Szatkowski and Robert Tucker — The new members of the formation team are expected to arrive in Chicago this week. Br. Duane Lemke will remain for approximately two weeks to assist with the transition prior to beginning his sabbatical.

IV. Next council meeting — The council will next meet July 12-13; Br. Presto said that the meeting packets would be sent by FED-EX on Thursday, June 30. Councilors are to begin their meeting at 9 a.m. on July 12 in the small dining room at Sacred Heart at Monastery Lake. Fr. Q. Nguyen will lead the group in a morning of reflection.

Fr. D. Nguyen said that he is having a difficult time finding someone to cover the liturgies at Our Lady of Guadalupe for those days. If he cannot find a priest to cover for him he may need to miss the meetings. Fr. Kilianski suggested that he look into the possibility of a communion service. If Fr. D. Nguyen is unable to be at the meeting, he can take part via phone.

Minutes of the 862nd Provincial Council Meeting July 12-13, 2016, Hales Corners, WI

PRESENT: Fr. Ed Kilianski, provincial superior; Fr. Quang Nguyen, Fr. Duy Nguyen, Fr. Christianus Hendrik, Fr. Jack Kurps and Br. Frank Presto, councilors; Mary Gorski, recording secretary.

I. Extended prayer and check-in — Councilors spent the first morning in prayer and reflection.

II. Administration

A. Province Assembly — The council reviewed the evaluations from the June 6-10 assembly. In general, participants seemed very satisfied with the experience and enjoyed the opportunities for socialization. The personal sharing of presenters was appreciated. The discomfort of sitting for extended periods on the folding chairs was the only concern frequently noted. Several SCJs also suggested that the day begin slightly later, perhaps 9 a.m. instead of 8:30 a.m.

Fr. Hendrik said that in his community a few men suggested former SCJs be invited to visit during a future assembly.

B. Senior Life Committee — Fr. Kilianski will ask the Senior Life Committee to discuss the concerns of retired SCJs living outside of the two designated retirement communities. Is it better for an SCJ to remain in the area where he has relationships established with doctors rather than moving to an SCJ retirement community in ill health and starting over? In general, how does the province monitor its elder members to both ensure that their preferences are respected but also that their well-being is attended to appropriately? The Senior Life Committee should begin looking at these issues so that they can advise the council.

C. Priesthood jubilees — The council reaffirmed Monday, November 14, as the day of the province celebration of jubilees of ordination. The Provincialate Offices will coordinate the celebration. Those celebrating 50 years of priesthood include Bishop Joseph Potocnak, Fr. Tony Russo, Fr. Tom Westhoven and Fr. Peter Mastrobuono.

Fr. Kilianski will talk to the jubilarians to determine approximately how many people they plan to invite to the celebration as well as where it should be held (SHM or SHML). He will work with Mary Gorski on the invitations and arrangements.

D. Admissions Board

1. Board membership — The council voted to appoint Br. Duane Lemke to the Admissions Board; he will fulfill Fr. Bob Tucker's term until 2019. Fr. Tucker is now a member of the formation team and thus resigned from the board.

The council also voted to reappoint the following board members whose current terms have been fulfilled (the next term end date is listed after each name): Fr. Tony Russo as chairman (2019), Fr. Jim Brackin (2019), Fr. Jan de Jong (2018), Fr. Paul Kelly (2017), and Fr. Charles Yost (2017). Members of the board whose terms have not run out: Fr. Bob Bossie (2017), Fr. Joseph Dinh (2018) and Fr. Richard MacDonald (2018).

2. Admissions Policy — The Admissions Board suggested two changes to the policy regarding Admissions to Candidacy:
 - a. Medical examination (paragraph C) — Noting the importance of knowing the full scope of an applicant’s physical and psychological health the board suggested that the policy be changed to specify that medical tests are required for both chronic and life-threatening diseases. The council voted to approve the following revision to paragraph C (new words are in CAPITAL letters): “Applicants will undergo tests for any CHRONIC or life-threatening disease, including but not limited to cancer, diabetes, HIV, heart disease and liver disease. Such extensive and thorough testing is meant to ensure REASONABLY healthy candidates to the province.”
 - b. English competency — The board suggested that when a person is accepted for candidacy without competency in English (meaning that his English skills are not to the level required for higher studies and full engagement in the formation community) that a time limit be set for him to bring his English competency to an appropriate level. Also, during his ESL studies he should be assigned an SCJ mentor or supervisor.

The council appreciated this concern but noted several related issues. Although a limited-English speaking applicant is able to have his psychological testing done in his native language, are the questions themselves formed from an Anglo perspective? If so, does this affect how a non-English speaker may interpret them?

Also, it was noted that once the Admissions Board accepts an applicant its work is done. It is not the body that determines whether a candidate is making appropriate progress in formation, including academics. It is up to the formation team to monitor all candidates, including those in ESL. Perhaps formation guidelines need to be adapted to address the special situation of candidates in ESL.

The council decided to continue discussion of this issue at the September meeting.

Related to this, it was noted that there is a new TOEFL scoring system; province policies should be adapted to reflect the new system.

- E. Dehon Study Center — Fr. Jim Schroeder has agreed to continue the work of the Dehon Study Center. The center will remain in its present location at SHML.
- F. International requests
 1. Fr. Heru Ismadi — The out-going secretary general has asked to come to the US Province to study ESL in preparation for graduate studies. His provincial superior (Fr. Andreas Madya Sriyanto of Indonesia) made a formal request to Fr. Kilianski. Fr. Kilianski approved the request. The US Province is grateful to the Indonesian Province for its continued collaboration in ministry, especially in South Dakota. Fr. Kilianski welcomes further opportunities for collaboration, including education.
 2. Fr. Dharma — Fr. Dharma of the India District asked to do graduate studies in communications in the United States. However, he was unable to obtain a visa for such studies. He has asked that the US Province instead sponsor him to do a one-year film and television course at an institute in India. After completing the course, Fr. Dharma would then like to apply for a visa to come to the US Province and do parish ministry for three to five years.

Fr. Tom Cassidy told Fr. Dharma that his district superior, Fr. Thomas Vinod, must make the request to Fr. Kilianski. Fr. Kilianski has not received a formal request from Fr. Vinod regarding Fr. Dharma.
- G. Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology — The council voted to appoint Fr. Robert Cook, OFM Conv., to the SHSST Board of Directors. He is an alumnus of SHSST and has an extensive academic background including a law degree from the Boston School of Law. He is currently at the Shrine of Saint Anthony in Ellicott City, MD.
- H. North American Dehonian retreats — SCJs in the US and Canada received an invitation from Frs. John van den Hengel and Ed Kilianski (superiors of the two North American entities) to attend one of two Dehonian retreats: August 13-19, 2017 in Mississauga, Ontario (near Toronto) and May 6-12, 2018 in Racine, Wisconsin. A third retreat, just for those in formation and their directors, will be held August 5-12, 2018, in Racine. SCJs were asked to indicate by July 12, 2016, which retreat they would attend. The early date is necessary due to scheduling concerns with the retreat centers. As of the council meeting there had been 55 responses. Frs. Kilianski and van den Hengel will attend all three retreats.

- I. General Plan — Earlier in the year entities were asked to respond to the following request from the general administration: “By April 4, 2016, before the General Council begins its meetings for the spring session, list the five actions that can be immediately started in your entity in this year, 2016.”

Entities are now asked to turn their attention to the second request made by Fr. General in January, 2016: “By October 1, 2016, in preparation for the meeting of Major Superiors, develop a long-term plan that can be initiated in your entity from now until the next General Chapter in 2021.”

Fr. Kilianski asked for the council’s input on this. It was decided to review the work that was done by the local communities in response to the first question and use it as a basis for reflection on the first day of the council meeting in September. Fr. Kurps will develop a process to do this. Mary Gorski will send him the responses from the local communities.

- J. Document on Spiritual Direction — Major superiors of religious communities in the United States received a joint letter from the Congregation for Clergy and the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life. The letter deals with priestly formation, the need for a stable presence among seminary rectors and spiritual directors, and the specific formation of seminary formators. The letter was forwarded to the formation team for the US Province; the president-rector of SHSST also received a copy.

- K. Current and future ministries — Fr. Kilianski stressed the need for the province to be proactive in planning for its future. How does the province create its future as opposed to simply reacting to changing situations? Several province ministries would face significant difficulty if a key person left it unexpectedly. Topics that surfaced during this discussion:

1. Novitiate — The council affirmed that the novitiate will remain in the United States for the next novitiate class. There is the possibility of three to four novices. Candidates need to be informed of the procedures for applying for novitiate.
2. Summer ministry experiences — Councilors informally shared information about the formation students and their summer ministries. The experiences seem to have been good for both the students and the ministries and communities to which they were assigned.
3. South Dakota — Fr. Hendrik said that he is in contact with the new Indonesian provincial superior regarding a continued commitment from Indonesia to SCJ ministries in South Dakota.
4. Vietnam — In December Fr. Francis Vu Tran will meet with the council in his role as district superior of Vietnam to discuss several possibilities for collaboration, including sending Vietnamese SCJs to the US Province for ministerial experience.
5. Lay staff — It was suggested that the province look at more ways in which lay people can take on further roles in current ministries, including administrative needs in local communities.
6. Retired — Many retired SCJs would welcome the opportunity to do help-out ministry (weekend Masses) in SCJ parishes.
7. Religious life — The province is filled with talented men. It is frustrating when important ministries are difficult to fill because few are willing to take them. Do SCJs need to challenge each other more often to look beyond personal concerns and try to better serve province needs?

- L. Justice, Peace and Reconciliation

1. JPR grants — When the council hired a province JPR director it did so with the stipulation that money that previously went to JPR grants would be used to pay for the JPR director’s salary. Initially grants were reduced, but at the urging of the JPR Commission the grant amounts have risen. Councilors would like to know the criteria for the grants. Their desire is that grants only be considered for organizations that have a direct SCJ connection. Councilors did not question the work or validity of any of the grant recipients but indicated that there has to be a focus in how its money is used. How can the province have the greatest impact with its resources?

Representatives from the JPR Commission will be with the council in September. They will be asked to discuss the grant process.

2. JPR Commission member terms — Commission members no longer seem to have terms. The council would like to discuss with the commission how members are chosen for it, how many members it should have, and whether terms should be designated.
3. Immigration/migration — At the meeting of the two North American councils it was suggested that immigration/migration be the primary focus of the JPR Commission. Members of the Canadian Region could be invited to join the commission and work together to continue the work of the North American Immigration Committee. Both councils indicated that they wanted this work to continue.

Since that time, it was noted that a commission can only be changed by a chapter decision. The JPR Commission cannot be disbanded or reconfigured by the council to be a North American committee.

Immigration/migration needs to be a focus of the JPR Commission, but collaborative efforts on immigration/migration also should continue. The general plan asks entities to focus on immigration/migration and on ways to collaborate with other entities. This is an important collaborative issue for North American SCJs.

In the summary of the council meeting sent to the membership by email it will be noted that the council affirmed that the work of the North American Immigration Committee should continue. The council will ask members of the US Province to consider serving on this committee. Those who are interested, or who would like more information, should contact the province secretary, Br. Frank Presto.

- M. Request for faculties — Br. Presto explained the revised procedures to be used when requesting temporary faculties from a diocese for an SCJ. Councilors emphasized the importance of working collaboratively with bishops.
- N. Minutes of the 861st Provincial Council meeting — The council voted to approve the minutes of the 861st council meeting held by conference call on June 28, 2016.
- O. Provincial visitations — Fr. Kilianski shared his proposed visitation calendar. The theme for the 2017 visitations will be “Living the Vow of Poverty.” Initially, Fr. Kilianski said that he was going to challenge individuals, communities and the province to cut 5-10% from their budgets. Councilors discussed this and noted that communities and ministries have already been asked to maintain or reduce their budgets. Some communities are going through significant transitions, such as SHML and the Dehon Formation Community. They are still unsure of their budget needs during the next year.

The membership needs to reflect in a mindful, prayerful way on how it — individually and as a province — utilizes resources. Are all members of the community aware of how much it costs to maintain the operation of a community house: staff costs, utilities, food, cars, and other basic items? Do individuals feel a responsibility (ownership) for these costs? How do SCJs have conversations about spending and consumption without being judgmental of one another? How does the community work together, as brothers in community, to live its vow of poverty more authentically?

The council will discuss this in greater depth at the September meeting. Fr. Kilianski will follow up the conversation with a letter about the 2017 visitations, including the visitation schedule.

III. Membership

- A. Fr. Mark Mastin — Fr. Kilianski shared a letter from the senior Catholic chaplain at Fort Gordon, Georgia, which outlined the job which Fr. Mastin was being asked to undertake as a contract chaplain. Fr. Mastin will begin his three-year assignment at Fort Gordon at the beginning of September. He will move there after he returns from World Youth Day in Poland.

Fr. Mastin’s assignment concludes in 2019; this will fulfill his obligation to the US Army.

- B. Br. Duane Lemke — Fr. Kilianski shared Br. Lemke’s sabbatical plans; he will first spend time in South Dakota with family, SCJs and on retreat. In fall he will take part in a sabbatical program (spiritual focus) at the Mercy Center in Colorado Springs and in the winter-spring semester he will enroll in the Hesburgh Program at Catholic Theological Union (theological sabbatical). Br. Lemke’s sabbatical year will end with a historical tour in the east. He will be available for assignment after June, 2017.

During his sabbatical Br. Lemke will be attached to St. Joseph’s Community at SHML. His financial concerns will be handled by the Province Treasurer’s Office.

- C. Frater Juan Carlos Castañeda Rojas — After renewing his vows Frater Rojas will go to South America, first to visit family in Colombia and then to Taubaté, Brazil, to begin his pastoral year. He received his visa for the year. Fr. Kilianski has been in contact with Fr. Ronilton Souza Araújo, provincial superior of the Brazil – Sao Paulo Province. A member of the province, Fr. Djalma Tuniz, the rector of Convento Sagrado Coração de Jesus, will serve as Frater Roja’s formation director in Brazil.

The US Province will pay for Frater Roja’s travel to South America; that and other expenses will go through the Dehon Formation Community.

Although the pastoral year is a part of Roja’s formation experience, an assignment letter is needed for visa purposes. Br. Presto will draft a letter for Fr. Kilianski to review.

- D. Pinellas Park — Fr. Kilianski shared updates from Fr. Greg Speck on the Sacred Heart Community in Pinellas Park. Br. Gabriel Kersting continues to have a good spirit but physically is weakening; he has difficulty getting out of a chair and walking. Fr. Tom Lind has struggled with his health since his arrival from Mississippi.

Candidate Patrick Skahill spent several weeks in ministry in the community; Fr. Speck said that he was a great help to him and an asset to the community.

During their discussion of Pinellas Park councilors noted the importance of training SCJs and lay staff in “universal precautions.” Regardless of a person’s known health history, certain precautions must always be taken to prevent contact with bodily fluids. It was suggested that Barbara Haag be asked to find a healthcare professional to set up a workshop on universal precautions and other healthcare mindfulness at SHML (such as how to appropriately assist a confrere who has fallen).

- E. Br. Bernard Taube — He continues to do well in Madison; Fr. Bill Pitcavage visits with him regularly. Br. Taube comes to Milwaukee weekly for medical appointments.

IV. Finance

- A. Province Development Office — The transition to working with Kory Christianson and others from the team at St. Joseph’s Indian School is going well. The office is looking at new concepts and packages developed by consultants used by St. Joseph’s. The first two quarters of the year have been good; there have been \$2 million in bequests and another \$2 million in annuities. There have been good returns on the mailings.
- B. Investments — Dn. Nagel explained that he and others have lost confidence in their representative from Merrill Lynch, Monica Matthews. Dn. Nagel contacted Ms. Matthews’ supervisor to express his concerns. She suggested that The Ryan Group would be an excellent replacement. Dn. Nagel and John Kuxhause interviewed representatives from The Ryan Group on June 30 and were impressed by their experience. Based in New York, NY, the Ryan Group has an extensive history of working with Catholic organizations, including Notre Dame University. James Ryan, managing director, has served on a finance panel for the Vatican.

The council voted to approve the transfer of investments held by Merrill Lynch from the Matthews-Nealon Group to The Ryan Group.

- C. Audits — Schenck Business Solutions has been hired to conduct the financial audits for the Province Development Office and the Provincialate Offices. The audits will begin in August and should be finished by October 1, 2016.
- D. General treasurer’s visit — Fr. Luca Zottoli, his assistant Aldo Vivaldi and Fr. Jesús Valdezate Soto (member of the General Finance Commission) visited the US Province June 19-29. They spent time in Hales Corners and in South Dakota learning about development programs here, as well as the ministries of South Dakota.

The General Curia is emphasizing the need for all entities to work toward financial self-sufficiency. The general treasurer is looking at possibilities for international fundraising.

Dn. Nagel said that the visitors were impressed with the information shared and the transparency of province finances. They were interested in Dn. Nagel’s suggestion to create a Ministry Trust Fund to which all entities would contribute. This would be a resource for entities to then borrow from for major projects.

E. Meetings — The General Finance Commission will meet in Rome November 24-25; commission members will take part in the Major Superiors' meeting on November 29.

Notes from Justice Peace & Reconciliation Commission Meeting
May 25, 2016
Provincialate Offices, Hales Corners, WI

Present: Fr. Bob Bossie, Fr. John Czyzynski, Fr. Wayne Jenkins, Fr. Johnny Klingler, Greg Schill (by phone), Mark Peters

Meeting began with member updates and a prayer based on Fr. Dehon's Retreat with the Sacred Heart, 40th Meditation (found in one of Dave Schimmel's weekly mailings).

We spent the morning discussing the grant applications received from 13 organizations in Milwaukee, Green Bay, Chicago and Houston. As mandated in our newly-approved criteria for funding, we considered the Dehonian nature of the ministries, their effectiveness, their need, our province priorities of immigration and economic justice, and their connection to the Priests of the Sacred Heart. We also decided that the minimum amount we wanted to give was \$2500 and the maximum \$10,000, at least at this time. (We are still working with an amount that has not been adjusted for inflation since the 80's, and which was cut in half to fund the new JPR Director position, and will ask the Finance Commission and Council to consider increasing funding so we can do more for groups like these that are doing the kind of ministry Fr. Dehon would be doing today.) We also agreed that we would not eliminate any group's funding without one year's notice.

In the end, we gave \$10,000 to Casa Juan Diego in Houston for their work with undocumented persons who are sick or disabled and to the 8th Day Center in Chicago for their work on many justice, peace and environmental issues with a number of local collaborators. \$9000 went to The Benedict Center and The Dominican Center in Milwaukee, who work with two of the most vulnerable populations in the city – African-Americans in one of the poorest Zip Codes in the nation and women engaged in prostitution.

A new group, Voces de la Frontera of Milwaukee, received \$8000 for their service and advocacy on behalf of immigrants and the undocumented, as did SET Ministry for its ground-breaking work with trauma-informed care for those in low-income housing and violent neighborhoods in Milwaukee. Receiving \$6500 was the Br. David Darst Center in Chicago for their unique ministry of providing justice formation "plunges" for Catholic students, parishioners, and others around the country.

\$5000 each was awarded to Magnificat Houses in Houston, championed by Frank Wittouck, and Common Ground in Milwaukee, "going to the people" to learn their issues and developing everyday citizens into civic leaders. TMO in Houston got \$2500 for doing the same type of work as an IAF community organization, and St. John Homeless Shelter in Green Bay received the same amount. Port Ministries received \$3500 for their work in the Back of the Yards in Chicago, Catholic Charities Houston received \$2500 for their work helping legal immigrants obtain citizenship. Due to their very large (\$35 million) budget and ability to serve only documented persons, we will consult with Duy Nguyen about the possibility of telling them that this will be the last year for this grant.

Finally, we considered a request from David Jackson, a former SCJ, to accept an application next year from Valley Interfaith (a former grant recipient). We agreed that the new criteria mean that a group does not have to be in an area where SCJs are present (e.g. Green Bay) to be considered, so Mark will tell him to go ahead and send in an application, although no promise will be made of funding. We are already feeling spread too thin.

Discussion in Preparation for Meeting with Provincial Council in September: This took up most of the afternoon. Mark began with a brief Director's Report in which he explained that 90% of his time is now

given to social justice ministry with other groups and not with SCJ entities. The Commission then discussed questions related both to the Director's job description and the JPR Commission's mission that we would like to bring up at our meeting with the Council this September. Bob Bossie agreed to write up a set of questions for our review by June 14.

Boycott of companies connected to Israeli settlements in Palestine. CMSM has invited our participation in the boycotting/divestment of any products or companies connected to the illegal settlements in Palestine. Mark will find out if the Province owns shares of any of the targeted companies and if so ask Dn. David Nagel for an opportunity to discuss this with the Finance Commission.

We scheduled our next meeting for Wed. Sept. 14, 2016, in Hales Corners, after the meeting with the Council in the morning.
